Are you a First Nations person living in Queensland and interested in an exciting opportunity to develop genomics & genetics resources?

This is an opportunity to partner with Queensland Health, Health Consumers Queensland & CQUniversity to build community awareness and health literacy by developing genomics and genetic healthcare resources.

We are looking for <u>10</u> Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people from across Queensland to act as Community Champions.

Genes, DNA & Genetic Healthcare

DNA holds your family history [stories] in your blood and your body. These are passed on to you through your parents, grandparents and ancestors. Everyone has their own unique DNA.

DNA is the recipe for genes and holds the instructions on how your body works. Genes are arranged within the DNA in most cells in your body. Some differences in the arrangement or structure of these genes can cause illness, cancer other conditions. We can tell a lot about you by reading your gene stories.

Health services are moving towards using your DNA stories to look at which treatments will work better for you. The more DNA stories they read, the better treatment they can design.

Your Role as a Community Champion

What is involved?

Over a 12 month period, Community Champions will:

- Participate in <u>6</u> online focus groups facilitated by Greg Pratt, a leading First Nations genomics researcher, where you will:
 - Learn about genetics and genomics.
 - Co-design resources to support community awareness of genetics and genomics.
- Promote the developed resource/s with your community to increase health literacy and awareness of genomics, and then come back to tell us what the community is saying.







What skills do you need to be a Community Champion?

You do not need any formal qualifications to become a Community Champion. We are looking for consumers and community members across Queensland who:

- Are passionate about sharing information with their community to increase health literacy and improve health outcomes.
- Have an interest in genetic healthcare.
- Have access to a computer, laptop or phone to attend online focus groups and review necessary information prior to and during the sessions.

Remuneration and Support

- Community Champions will be paid for their time and contribution in line with HCQ rates, which can be found here.
- Community Champions will be supported throughout the project and are encouraged to reach out to the Project Team at any time.
